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The integumentary system has two major components, the cutaneous membrane (skin), and accessory structures (Figure 4-1). The skin is divided into three layers: the epidermis, the dermis, and subcutaneous tissue. The accessory structures include the hair, nails, vascular supply, sweat glands, and sebaceous glands.

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The Integumentary System is composed of the skin, glands, hair, and nails. Let's take a look at the structure and function of the integumentary system. + +. The skin consists of three layers (Fig. 4-1). The epidermis is the thin outer layer that is constructed mostly of nonliving, keratinized (hardened) cells. It is waterproof and provides protection for the deeper layers. The epidermis is thickest on the palms of the hands and the soles of the feet.
