When Sensory Integration and the Child was first published in the late 1970s, many aspects of her work were becoming more widely known.

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Sensory integration theory originated from the work of A. Jean Ayres, PhD, OTR, an occupational therapist and psychologist, whose clinical insights and original research revolutionized occupational therapy practice with children. Dr Ayres defined sensory integration as “the organization of sensations for use.

### **Sensory Integration - Animated Language Learning**

Sensory Processing Disorder or SPD (originally called Sensory Integration Dysfunction) is a neurological disorder in which the sensory information that the individual perceives results in abnormal responses.
